#### PROJECT DESCRIPTION

1. Describe the project and explain how it will achieve the goals of Resolution 2000-156 and 2020-79 to plan for the future growth of Volusia County and enhance the quality of life for its residents (use factual information/documentation to show how project will accomplish these goals).

This project, for a playground at the DeLand YMCA has once been submitted to and approved by ECHO in the past. Unfortunately, due to the Covid-19 pandemic, we were unable to complete the project in the time allotted by ECHO. We are applying for funding for this project again. With a change in leadership at the Volusia Flagler YMCA, the project has changed slightly and that is described here for you below.

All programs and activities of the DeLand YMCA are designed to build healthy spirit, mind, and body for all residents of Volusia County. Each improvement and addition to our programs and facilities are specifically designed to meet critical needs in the community by connecting families, improving health, and impacting youth. The Y is dedicated to promoting character development values of caring, honesty, respect, and responsibility while we serve the residents of Volusia County.

The DeLand YMCA, a community center serving the area for decades, is designed to meet much more than the swimming and exercising needs of local residents through a wide variety of programs and services. The YMCA has always been more than a gym and swim and we work hard every day to educate the community that we have many services available to anyone in the community, both Y members and those who choose to use a daily pass. Childcare and summer camp as well as several evidenced based health programs have been offered for years at the Y and are available to anyone in the community who meet the program criteria.

All services of the Volusia Flagler Family YMCA Association are available to the public. Anyone can enjoy the YMCA whether it be through membership, by using a daily pass, or by enrolling in specific programs and activities.

The DeLand Playground Project will enhance the quality of life for its residents by providing outdoor recreational opportunities for public use.

We are requesting ECHO funding to upgrade the playground at the Deland YMCA. Playgrounds are a perfect match for ECHO funding. This amenity will be available to the public during YMCA operating hours and meet the goals of Resolution 2000-156 " to enhance the quality of life for its residents by providing environmental, cultural, historical and outdoor recreational opportunities." We will upgrade our playground to include more play areas with modern play stations to appeal to a larger group of children and families. All of these features are designed to help children of all abilities learn and grow through play.

While we cannot keep the gates open to the playground at all times for public access for insurance and other obvious reasons such as the need to protect our program participants, the DeLand YMCA playground will be open to the public and available to anyone in Volusia



County during operating hours.

The DeLand YMCA is open the following hours:

Mon - Thu: 5:00am - 9:00pm

Fri: 5:00am - 8:00pm Sat: 8:00am - 5:00pm Sun: 1:00pm - 5:00pm

The public can enjoy the playground in several ways.

- 1. Be a part of our programs Afterschool, Summer Camp, Youth Sports
- 2. Siblings, relative and friends who come with the youth sport participant can use the playground.
- 3. Become a member of the Y.
- 4. Use the playground for the day with the purchase of a day pass.

The YMCA does not turn anyone away for inability to pay. The DeLand YMCA gave over \$56,000 in financial assistance to help those who can not afford to pay attend programs and for memberships.

The current playground has only one slide and two swing sets. By providing a variety of play activities, the new playground will appeal to a wider audience. With new equipment and design, the playground will be more interactive for kids and parents. The new space will provide a more active play environment which we know will attract a larger number of children and families to play there.

The new playground at the DeLand YMCA will be ADA compliant with rubber mulch surface made from recycled tires, a wheelchair ramp, transfer station and ground level play stations. (A playground with a primary focus on children with disabilities is planned for the Port Orange YMCA next year.)

Our playground will be ADA compliant, not just because it is required, but because we feel it encourages more free play for kids. Free play on playgrounds has physical, mental, emotional, and cognitive benefits for children and parents. Free play also can promote family interaction and relationship building. Our playground will be accessible to parents, grandparents and caregivers who may have different physical conditions. This will expand the number of users who can benefit from outdoor play at the YMCA.

Our playground will be made up of a variety of traditional and active play events, creating a space where children of all abilities can play together. The play structures and equipment will provide kids with opportunities to develop socially from playing independently at a young age, transitioning to parallel play, and learning how to cooperatively play together as their development continues.

One play system, already purchased for the proposed playground, is called Discovery Ridge. Pictures are provided in the drawings section of this application. Discovery Ridge, designed for children aged 2-5, is described below.



The two-deck structure is designed with a variety of developmental and educational activities that encourage children to learn, grow, and lead healthy lifestyles. This structure provides music and movement opportunities as children play the rain wheel and bongo drums, encouraging self-expression. The roof also offers comfortable shade and visual appeal with the leafy canopy underside. From inside the structure, children can move the hands on the clock panel promoting fine motor development!

A second play system will be focused on 5 to 12 year old children. A sample of such a play system is the Slide Mountain Play System. A picture is provided in the drawings section of this application and the system is described here below.

Slide Mountain features three exciting slides - including the Double Slide. This structure also features 3 challenging climbers - the Deluxe Rock Climb, Rung Climber and Bean Stalk Climber.

The new DeLand YMCA playground will meet ADA guidelines and be compliant with ASTM & CSPC, IPEMA certified. The equipment features powder coated steel posts, coated steel decks and molded plastic components. Quality metal and plastic components are designed to withstand public play.

Of course, our playgrounds will encourage our kids to move. Movement is essential to life and to play. Motion play like climbing and sliding can help children develop spatial awareness, inner ear stimulation and balance.

Encouraging physical activity and laying the groundwork for a healthy lifestyle is important for our children now more than ever. The 2020 State of Obesity report from the Trust for America's Health sadly reports that for the first time, US adult obesity rate is over 40%. Rates of childhood obesity are increasing as well with 19.3% of young people ages 2 to 19 have obesity. 40 years ago the rate for young people with obesity was at only 5.5%.

The Trust for America's Health reports that being overweight or having obesity as a young person puts them at higher risk for having obesity and its related health risks as an adult. They also report that children are having earlier onset of what used to be considered adult conditions like hypertension and high cholesterol.

One of the steps in combating obesity, according to this Trust for America's health study is to make physical activity and the built environment safer and more accessible for all by making community spaces more conducive and safer for physical activity and encouraging outdoor play. The DeLand YMCA playground will provide a safe place for physical activity available to any resident of Volusia County.

While Florida, with an adult obesity rate of 27%, is doing relatively well in comparison to other



states, the rate for obese children ages 10-17 in Florida is the eighth highest in the country with 17.8% having obesity. Only 22.6% of children ages 6-17 in Florida report participating in 60 minutes of physical activity every day.

According to the Florida State Health Assessment of 2017, youth who partake in physical activity have healthier hearts, stronger bones and muscles and a reduced risk of chronic diseases. The report also states that physical activity can reduce symptoms of anxiety and depression.

In an article by American Psychological Association titled How and Why to Get Children Moving Now, Melissa Santos, PHD, a pediatric psychologist at the University of Connecticut School of medicine and clinical director for the obesity clinic at Connecticut Children's Hospital says that encouraging children to move their bodies is important not only for physical health but for mental health and cognitive development. She says "There are so many benefits to exercise, and we keep discovering more. There's no part of a body that doesn't benefit from physical activity." The article also says that young people who exercise more have lower levels of depression, stress and psychological distress and higher levels of positive self-image, life satisfaction and psychological well-being. Additionally, regular exercise can improve behavior and help children pay attention more and have better long term academic performance. Children who are healthy and physically fit are more likely to graduate high school and go on to post high school education. They are more likely to continue their active health lifestyle into adulthood and be productive contributing members of our community.

These are some of the reasons that the YMCA is partnering with ECHO to bring quality outdoor recreation opportunities to the residents of Volusia County. Encouraging healthy living is one of the overarching goals of the YMCA. The new playground will be instrumental in helping our kids learn that play and physical activity can be fun. Our goal is to make physical activity and a healthy lifestyle and part of their life as they grow into adulthood.

The DeLand Playground Project will provide high quality, user oriented outdoor recreational opportunities.

The Volusia Flagler Family YMCA has been serving the community since 1919. We are a part of a highly respected national organization which has been meeting the needs of communities around the world for more than 160 years. In Volusia County, the Yis held in high regard by local governments, businesses, service organizations and the public. We are experts in providing fitness and recreational opportunities to our communities. The DeLand Playground will be maintained and sustained with the same professional and fiscally responsible practices as with all of our programs in the past.

The Y is unique in our focus on the family and our commitment to promoting youth development, healthy living, and social responsibility in everything we do. The DeLand YMCA offers an extensive array of recreational, exercise, education, and community activities all in one location. Programs and oversight are provided by trained professionals at all times. YMCA programs have always provided specific opportunities for people with various levels of physical abilities, including the stroke rehabilitation provided in partnership with Halifax Rehabilitation.



2. Describe the project and construction timeline.

The DeLand Playground project will upgrade the playground area at the DeLand YMCA.

Upon approval and release of funds, we will order the playground equipment and begin clearing the site of the old play equipment and removing the old fence surrounding the area. The total area is just over 9,000 square feet. We will use 2,300 square feet of that area for the playground and use the remaining area for an open grass play area.

Currently, delivery time for the playground equipment is 8 to 10 weeks. During that time, some basic site preparation will be completed to level the area before the equipment is installed. When the equipment arrives, it will be assembled and installed. The safety surface will be put down and the existing fence will be moved and adjusted to fit the new configuration and surround the play area. This work will all be done in house.

The project will begin immediately upon award and release of funds, and we expect it to be completed in 3 to 4 months. Providing there are no delays in the supply chain, the new playground will be open to the public by summer of 2022.

The playground at the DeLand YMCA is an outdoor project and naturally incorporates green and sustainable standards. There will be insignificant impact on the natural resources and the construction will not require removing any trees or plants.

The ADA compliant surface under the play equipment is made of durable rubber mulch which is made from recycled tires. According to Recycled Rubber Products, each ton of rubber mulch recycles 134 tires and saves countless trees. The mulch is non-biodegradable and low maintenance. It is non-toxic and environmentally friendly. This surface is ADA compliant and is eco-friendly by reducing the amount of water used for landscaping and maintenance. Additionally, no fertilizer is needed and there is a reduced cost for maintenance. The play equipment meets all safety standards but is not made of any recyclable materials.

4. Describe how the project will comply with the ADA accessibility requirements.

The surface under the play equipment will be covered with shredded rubber chips which are safe and ADA compliant. They will be raked regularly to keep an even, deep distribution as required by the ADA.

The playground will include a wheelchair ramp and a transfer station which complies with ADA requirements making the project accessible to those with varying abilities. We are including ground level play stations which are lower to the ground to enable play opportunities for



children of all sizes, ages and abilities, especially those using mobility devices.

The YMCA tracks the number of children who attend the programs of the YMCA and use daily passes to access all of the amenities we offer, including the playground. We also track the number of hours of physical activity that children and all of our members participate in.

The YMCA acts as one member of the community of service providers whose goals are to improve the health and well-being of the residents of Volusia County. We study the outcomes posted by the United Way and other county and state agencies who focus on the health and well-being of our community, and we are striving along with the other providers to improve the statistics for our residents.



Our outdoor playground project will use the current playground space. We will remove old equipment and replace it with new equipment and an eco-friendly safety surface. This project does not require floor plans as the project does not include any buildings. We have provided drawings of the play systems that are planned for this new playground.

No landscape plan is necessary as we do not plan to change any existing trees or plants in the area of the playground. As noted previously, the surface materials we are using are congruent with the Florida-friendly landscape plan as they are sustainable and low maintenance and require no watering.

#### MATCH DOCUMENTATION

Our match consists of unencumbered cash in the amount of \$24,830.52 and previously spent cash of \$5,069.48.

The Previously spent cash match comes from a play system which was purchased earlier this year when we were still expecting to finish the playground funded in a previous ECHO grant. Due to the pandemic and delays in production and shipping, we were not able to receive all play systems and materials in time to complete the project in the allotted ECHO time. Therefore, we are using the purchase of this play system as previously spent cash, and this will be one of the systems in our playground.

The play system was purchased from WillyGoat Toys and Playgrounds. It was purchased online and with a credit card. You will see in the following documents the confirming email invoice which includes other parts used in another YMCA playground. The play system we are using in this project and being submitted as previously spent cash is the Discovery Ridge Playground with Roof. We have submitted the credit card statement showing the charge and the following credit card statement showing that the earlier charge has been paid off. Because we purchased other items at the same time as this play system, the amount on the credit card statement reflects the whole invoice from WillyGoat which is \$6,724.80.

We have submitted a current bank statement to demonstrate the unencumbered cash on hand available for our match.

## Staffing

The Playground at the DeLand YMCA is used by children in our KidZone, our licensed afterschool program, childcare, and summer camps. These programs provide a safe, nurturing environment for more than 300 children annually under the supervision of qualified, professional staff. Our 180 soccer players and more than 50 flag football players can be found on the playground as well before and after practices and games.

Outdoor play and physical activity are a part of all our children's programs. Having a modern, accessible, and safe play area aimed at including children of all abilities to play, learn and grow together will benefit all the children attending these programs as well as other children who simply stop by to play.

The DeLand YMCA Afterschool Enrichment program employs 6 full time staff and serves close to 100 children. Summer camp has a much larger enrollment, of more than 250 children annually, and requires 18-20 staff members. We maintain a child to staff ratio per Department of Children and Families regulations and add staff as needed when our participant numbers grow. We don't anticipate a significant increase in the number of program participants because of the new playground but the costs of any additional staff needed for increased enrollment will be offset by the participant fees for the program. No new programs for children are planned at this time.

While the playground is open to the public during all operating hours, it is staffed only when the afterschool or other children's programs are using them. The Volusia Flagler YMCA requires all children under 12 to be accompanied by an adult.

The DeLand YMCA is open the following hours:

Mon – Thu: 5:00am – 9:00pm

Fri: 5:00am – 8:00pm Sat: 8:00am – 5:00pm Sun: 1:00pm – 5:00pm



## **Maintenance Requirements**

The playground equipment manufacturer provides a detailed maintenance plan and check list. This plan includes daily, weekly, and annual maintenance activities. Frequent inspection of all equipment is the most important part of this maintenance plan. Current maintenance and facilities staff will be trained to perform the inspections and necessary adjustments. We do not anticipate any additional staff needed to maintain the playground.

#### Fees

Use of the playground will be part of the benefit of a regular membership fee, daily usage fee, preschool program fee or after school program fees. The playground will also be included for athletes in our sports programs and their families when on premises for scheduled games and practices. No additional fees will be charged for the playground.

## YMCA Membership Fees

Membership is open to everyone in the community. One who has chosen to become a member of the Deland Y or any YMCA facility in the Volusia Flagler YMCA Association will have full access to the playground as well as the rest of the facility.

Anyone who is not a member can use the YMCA by being a part of our programs, accompanying youth sports participants to their games, or purchasing a daily pass.

Volusia Flagler Family YMCA has established a dual rate system for membership fees. Currently, this system includes the full price fees and rates based on scholarship. At this time, scholarship rates are available for people whose income is less than \$40,000. Depending on income, scholarship rates may discount pricing up to 50%. No one is ever turned away from the YMCA for inability to pay.

The afterschool and summer camp programs are available to anyone in the community.

## **Detailed Maintenance and Replacement Plan**

The DeLand YMCA will maintain the playground to the same high standards that are applied throughout our facilities.

The playground equipment manufacturer provides a detailed maintenance plan and check list. A large portion of maintenance activities for the playground equipment will be inspection to be sure we are maintaining safety guidelines. When adjustments to the equipment are necessary, the maintenance guide provides step by step instructions. The large majority of this work will be done by current maintenance and ground staff at the YMCA and will result in no additional costs.



The manufacturer warranties the play systems from 5 to 15 years. With dedicated maintenance, we expect the systems to last well beyond that time to meet at least the 20 years required by the restrictive covenants.

Recycled Rubber Products provides a 12-year color warranty with expectations that the product remains effective for several years longer.

As with all capital improvements and facility maintenance expenses, the YMCA budget process includes a short term and long term plan for funding to guarantee that we meet our commitment to the restricted covenants of all of our ECHO projects. The ECHO playground will serve the children and families of Volusia County for the 20 years required and for many years beyond that time.

Our daily participation numbers for our children's programs demonstrate the need for the playground and how many children can benefit from an upgraded, more modern and safer playground. More than 400 children are registered for or children's programs each year with average weekly attendance over 200.

The current playground is quite sparse with two swing sets and one set of monkey bars. It does not attract children and families who are not already at the DeLand YMCA for another program to come and play.

A new playground with more play structures, and ones designed to foster children's physical, cognitive, social and emotional development will attract non Y members to come and use the playground for recreation above and beyond any Y activities they may be participating in.

Our playgrounds will be ADA compliant and include play structures that allow children of varying abilities to learn, play and socialize together.

## **BUSINESS INFORMATION**

3. Has this organization defaulted on any grant in the past five years? If yes, please explain.

The Volusia Flagler YMCA has rescinded 2 ECHO grants in the past. The Covid-19 pandemic was the main reason for rescinding these grants as companies and nonprofits around the world had to rethink their operations and futures and do whatever was necessary to sustain operations, staffing and services to clients.

Both projects were in the planning process and beginning construction when the virus hit in early 2020. Within 2 months, the Volusia Flagler YMCA lost 55% of their membership and the operational budget dropped by \$2.5 million in 2 months. The leadership of the Volusia Flagler YMCA was forced to focus on sustaining operations and ensuring that the organization could be there to serve the community when the virus slowed and the shut downs were over. As we all know, that lasted much longer than anyone initially expected and money that was earmarked for expansions and projects was needed for operations. Thankfully, because of the responsible staff and board leadership, the Volusia Flagler YMCA has survived. Membership is almost back to prepandemic levels. We can once again focus on making improvements to facilities and amenities to better serve Volusia County residents.

The following ECHO grants were rescinded:

- 2018 ECHO grant for \$400,000 to fund a fitness trail at the Ormond Beach YMCA and add gates, lighting, and cameras at the ECHO funded dog park
  - Matching funds were diverted to funding operations to sustain the organization through the pandemic. Subsequently, the Volusia Flagler YMCA has turned focus onto improvements to the current facility and may in the future look again at similar projects to further enhance the outdoor areas around the Ormond Beach YMCA.
- 2017 ECHO grant for \$77,750 to fund a playground at the DeLand YMCA
  - Matching funds for this project were temporarily diverted to operations during the beginning of the pandemic as the DeLand branch was in danger of closing due to the loss of membership and the funding that provides. When funds were later secured again for the playground, the equipment was delivered and was to arrive in time to meet the deadline that was extended by the ECHO committee upon our request. Due to the pandemic, the manufacturing and shipping times were drastically slower than stated by the manufacturer and the playground equipment did not arrive in time. That equipment order was therefore canceled, and we are applying again for the project.

The Volusia Flagler YMCA has not rescinded or defaulted on any other grant.
