The City of DeBary received eight prior grant awards from the Volusia County ECHO program.

<u>2010 - Phase I</u>: ECHO Grant #10-06/\$250,000 Rob Sullivan Community Park – Two multipurpose fields and Parking Lot Extension adding 91 spaces, retention pond and connecting walkways. This project was completed and closed out on 10/18/2012.

<u>2012 - Phase II</u>: ECHO Grant #12-06/\$80,000 Rob Sullivan Community Park Improvements - Lighting. This project was completed and closed out on 5/30/2013.

<u>2014 - Phase III</u>: ECHO Grant #14-05/\$121,000. This phase included the addition of trail lights on the south side of the existing trail and the upgrades of two adjacent playing fields that were unusable for sports or recreation events due to unstable terrain and trip hazards. The existing dug out area was extended out by 10 lineal feet and the installation of an irrigation system and turf for the playing area on the two fields was completed and closed out in September of 2015.

2017 - Phase IV: ECHO Grant #17-02/\$315,000. This phase included the addition of a lighting system for the multi-purpose sports fields, playing field top dressing and the installation of a playground with a shade cover adjacent to the playing fields.

2021 – Phase V: ECHO Grant #21-01/\$150,000. This phase included the Rob Sullivan Operations Center and Shade Structure.



ECHO Grant #18-01/\$ 140,750. The City of DeBary Gateway Park Improvements. This project upgraded playground equipment and added new exercise equipment for public use.

2022 – Phase I: ECHO Grant #22-01/\$75,000. The City of DeBary Bill Keller Park Improvements. The Bill Keller Park Improvements Phase I project included installing LED lighting on the tennis and basketball courts and a new dog park.

2024- Phase I: ECHO Grant# 24-13/ \$2,500,000. Alexander Island Park Improvements Phase I. Phase 1 of the ECHO project includes the development of core site infrastructure, park entry sign, entry improvements, parking, stormwater treatment, trails, lightening detector, kayak launch, picnic areas, shelters, fishing pier, observation deck/tower, educational/interpretative signage, regulatory/safety/educational signage, and restrooms with the intent of allowing visitors to experience as much of the site as possible in balance with maintaining sensitive habitats. In addition, phase 1 includes over 0.14 miles of ADA accessible paved trails, 1.11 miles of unpaved natural surface trails, opening over 1.25 miles of trail opportunities.



PROJECT DESCRIPTION

17 Describe the project and explain how it will achieve the goals of Resolution 2020-79 to plan for the future growth of Volusia and enhance the quality of life for its residents (use factual information/documentation to show how this project will accomplish these goals):

This 19-acre park is geared toward the sports enthusiast. The Park has two tennis courts, two pickleball courts, three baseball diamonds, one full court basketball court, four half-court basketball courts, a dog park, a 1.4-mile fitness trail, an ADA playground with climbers, swings, platforms, and slides, two pavilions, restrooms, concession stand for league play and unique events, and parking is available for 162 vehicles. The scope of this ECHO project is to reconstruct the existing two pickleball courts, increasing the number of pickleball courts from two to three. Add fencing, lights and resurface tennis courts and basketball court. Resurfacing tennis and basketball courts is important to maintain a safe and playable surface by repairing cracks, unevenness, and worn areas, preventing potential injuries from slips and falls, improving the overall playing experience with consistent bounces, and extending the lifespan of the court by protecting it from weather damage and wear and tear over time; essentially, it ensures a smooth, even surface for optimal performance while minimizing risks for players. This project will meet that goal and provide the safe amenities that our residents and visitors demand. This portion of the project will also increase the current use of the courts due to improved safety and playability.

Resolution 2020-79

HIGH QUALITY, USER ORIENTED OUTDOOR RECREATIONAL OPPORTUNITIES FOR PUBLIC USE:

The City of DeBary continues to exemplify the goals set by the ECHO Resolution 2020-79 by providing a quality public location for outdoor recreational opportunities that enhance the quality of life for residents of Volusia County and visitors.

The City of DeBary has a proven track record of supporting the goal from the Volusia County, Florida Sustainability Action Plan of 2012, creating a culture within their city that promotes sustainable and healthy lifestyle, by providing outdoor recreational opportunities through high quality user-oriented parks.

The Bill Keller Park Improvements project was on the list of Strategic Initiatives for FY 2021-2022 that was discussed at the May 5, 2021, City Council meeting. At that same meeting, DeBary received the 2020 Bicycle Friendly Community of the Year Designation by Becky Afonso, Florida Bicycle Association. This is an example of DeBary's continued commitment to offering a safe public environment that encourages citizens and visitors to get out and move.



The Parks and Recreation Department hosted a workshop March 4, 2020, focusing on facilities and programs that ensure DeBary citizens have space to exercise, play, and do other activities to improve their quality of life. The Department operates parks and administers youth leagues, senior programs, special events, and a Summer Day Camp program.

On August 23, 2023 a public meeting was held to discuss the application for an ECHO grant for this project. Should the project be funded, it will be added to the Capital Expenditures for the approved FY 2024-2025 Budget accordingly.

Bill Keller Park is a widely used and highly recommended public city park in DeBary with an estimated annual user visit of 118,000. The public park was named for William Keller who served on the Volusia County Council, District 5, and was highly active in the community.

According to the USA Pickle Ball Association, there are more than "2.8 million pickleball participants in the nation, and more than 21,000 indoor and outdoor courts". This project will increase the promotion of active and healthy outdoor lifestyles and meet the growing demands from the public who utilize them. In addition, it will increase the number of recreation facilities, programs and opportunities in urban areas and rural communities.

Pickleball, basketball, and tennis provide inclusivity and diversity of the different players and demand for more courts from the public has been exponential throughout the country. With public access to all three venues and the expansion into 4 courts, provides residents and visitors the ability to connect with a diverse population while participating in the activity. Thus, this project will strengthen partnerships and build a stronger community.

The City of DeBary is growing rapidly with direct access to I-4 and U.S. highway 17-92, and serves as a corridor between Orlando, Daytona Beach, and Sanford. Demand for these types of facilities has grown and will continue to do so in the future.

The City of DeBary held a Council meeting on August 23, 2023 to discuss and get public input on the Keller Park Pickle Ball Courts and Improvements Project.

The City of DeBary budget workshops for the Fiscal Year 2024-2025 Annual Budget were open to the public. The final Fiscal Year 2024-2025 Annual Budget was approved by the DeBary City Council on September 20, 2023. Should the project be funded, it will be added to the Capital Expenditures for the approved FY 2024-2025 Budget accordingly.

The City Council of DeBary has awarded negotiation and execution powers of the required documents for the improvement of this property to the City Attorney and City Manager. The City Council has also empowered the City Manager to encumber, authorize or expend any funds needed to complete the project.

- The Parks Superintendent will dedicate 20% of the workweek to this project. This position will assist with the bid documents for the project bid package as well as coordinate with the selected vendors to oversee the installation portion of this project. The Parks Superintendent will also apply for project permits as required.

Goal 1:

The overarching goal of the Keller Park Pickle Ball Courts and Improvements Project Marketing Plan is to increase community and county awareness and engagement by utilizing environmentally responsible stewardship and developing a positive brand for the Keller Park Pickle Ball Courts and Improvements Project for residents, community leaders, community organizations and businesses located in the City of DeBary, Florida and Volusia County.

In addition, demands from residents and visitors require the City to address those needs. This game with the funny name is one of the fastest growing sports in the U.S. According to the USA Pickleball Association, there are more than "2.8 million pickleball participants in the nation, and more than 21,000 indoor and outdoor courts."

Goal 2: Make outdoor activities available to all citizens and visitors.

This goal is met as the project addresses amenities suitable for all ages (even centenarians!) and easy to learn, pickleball contains elements of tennis, ping-pong and badminton. While incredibly popular with seniors, the sport is picking up younger enthusiasts as well. It's a great form of exercise, and easier on the body than traditional racquet sports.

Additionally, providing safe and resurfaced tennis and basketball courts will increase the usage of those facilities to all that enjoy the sport.

Goal 3: Provide active recreation amenities for all ages.

The restructuring of the Bill Keller Park Pickleball Courts, which includes demolition of the two existing courts that have exceeded their life span after being converted from an old basketball court. The City of DeBary will build three new pickleball courts, add fence and lights and resurface the basketball and tennis courts. This restructuring addresses this goal and will increase the promotion of active and healthy lifestyles outdoors. Increasing the number of pickleball courts and resurfacing the basketball and tennis courts will attract more individuals to all the courts addressing this goal and increasing the number of the recreation facilities, programs and opportunities in urban areas and rural communities.

Operational and Maintenance plans are vital as they help preserve physical assets and natural beauty, prolonging public investment lifespans and reducing the need for costly repairs. This plan identifies regular maintenance tasks, such as landscaping, waste management, infrastructure upkeep, and facility inspections, including the frequency, staff resources, and



costs associated.

By adhering to a plan, parks can proactively address issues before they escalate, saving time and money in the long run. Regular maintenance also contributes to the safety of visitors, ensuring that park facilities are in good condition and minimizing potential hazards. The City of DeBary commits to maintaining the facility/project/property for the length of the 20-year restrictive covenant period.

The following items identify assumptions and key information that helped form the development of this operational and maintenance plan:

- The City of DeBary will operate the facility.
- The initial opening of the Pickle Ball Courts and Improvements Project is projected as of 2025.
- Maintenance staff assigned to this facility will be City employees. Some specialty services such as tree removal, bush hogging and burning will be completed through contracts.
- The City does not currently charge the department's administrative costs associated with operations.
- Proposed Hours of Operation:
 - 7 days a week: Dawn-Dusk.

The City of DeBary routinely monitors all facilities, budgets and equipment and replaces as needed.

BUSINESS PLAN/ PROJECT FEASIBILITY:

The City of DeBary Parks and Recreation Department plans for equipment repair and replacement in all park locations through the annual budget and capital improvement process. The Bill Keller Park Improvements project will be included in the ongoing business plan.

The feasibility of the new project is based on the popularity of the current Bill Keller Park amenities with both youth and adults, with an estimated annual user visit of 118,000. The new improvements that are planned with the addition of Pickle Ball Courts and lighting, and the resurfacing of the basketball and tennis courts, will enhance and add additional amenities that



will fit in with the current trend of the park experience desired by public users and expressed in surveys, public meetings, public workshops and attendance statistics.

The City of DeBary Parks and Recreation held a public meeting on August 23, 2023. The meeting focused on this particular project and its funding possibilities. Several residents, business owners, user groups and civic organizations attended.

The City of DeBary budget workshops for the Fiscal Year 2024-2025 Annual Budget were open to the public in July of 2024. The final Fiscal Year 2024-2025 Annual Budget was approved by the DeBary City Council on September 18, 2024.

MARKETING PLAN:

The City of DeBary marketing plan for Bill Keller Park and Improvements Project is to continue enhancing community awareness of the available park amenities, passive use, pavilion rentals and the first dog park in the City of DeBary. Marketing efforts will continue through various partner websites, newsletters, posters, flyers, email, and other social media sources such as Facebook, newspapers, and television. Upcoming events will continue to be advertised using social media sources mentioned above as well as follow up stories to share the success of the event with the public.

FISCAL STABILITY

The City of DeBary is a Municipal Government. The City of DeBary Parks & Recreation annual budget includes the operational expenses for Bill Keller Park. The park is already maintained by City Staff and any additional costs will be budgeted and paid out of the City's general fund. The maintenance assignments for the new project will be distributed to existing staff to cover the new amenities for Bill Keller Park in the maintenance schedule.
